
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CAPACITY UPDATE

COVID-19 numbers continue to be at a high point, with state cases at the highest level so far this year. Unvaccinated individuals continue to account for the majority of the increase. The left graft below shows hospitalization in Omaha, while the right graph shows hospitalizations by vaccination status.



Leadership and management have received a lot of comments regarding the postponement of surgeries and transfers. I will attempt to explain the fluidity of the situation so that hospital capacity might be better understood.

For Wednesday, December 1, 2021, we started the day with 255 inpatients and an inpatient readiness of orange. Our ICU is at 135% capacity with ICU patients overflowing to the GI lab and 6 North. There are 56 surgical patients needing a bed with 60 anticipated discharges. So, with the 17 beds available this morning, we will have 22 available beds at the end of the day if every scheduled discharge leaves the hospital today (which is unlikely). The majority of patients that come through the Emergency Department are class A-C. On average, the Emergency Department sees approximately 80-100 patients a day with roughly 30% of them being admitted. For example, yesterday, November 30, the ED saw 84 patients with 27 admissions.


On a daily basis, transfers from the Omaha area, Nebraska community hospitals and multiple states outside our region are turned down. On average, Methodist Hospital denies 8-9 transfers per day. The transfer center which has been set up through Nebraska is also having issues finding beds, sometimes making up to 70 calls per patient to facilitate a transfer.

I hope that the information above emphasizes the challenges that we face daily. We continue to limit surgeries due to the factors listed above, with the cancellation of most class D and E surgeries needing more than an overnight stay.


At the end of the day, it is hospital operations (not a pun) left holding the bag of backed up Emergency Department, PACU, dissatisfied patients, families, community and staff stretched too thin, as well as several potential safety issues. Please recognize the efforts that go into watching the hospital census, thoughtfully canceling surgeries that can be delayed and giving the staff kudos, rather than grief, for all of their hard work.
