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What is an outbreak?

"An outbreak is a sudden rise in the number of cases of a disease. An outbreak may occur in a community or geographical area, or may affect several countries. It may last for a few days or weeks, or even for several years." https://apic.org/monthly_alerts/outbreaks-epidemics-and-pandemics-what-you-need-to-know/



Identification

- ► Know your baseline
- Look for an unusual increase in symptoms
- Act early to prevent additional transmission
 - Do not wait for lab confirmation to act
- ▶ Hand Hygiene
 - https://www.cdc.gov/handhygiene/providers/guideline.html
- ► Appropriate PPE use
 - Make sure PPE is easily accessible

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Communication

- Notify management and staff immediately of a potential outbreak
- Develop a pre-arranged list of staff to notify
- Make sure staff know who to contact (multiple people)
- ▶ Post signs in public areas
- ▶ Health Department is a great resource
- ▶ Standing orders for tests &/or medication



Isolation

- Number of sick residents that will trigger a quarantine of a neighborhood.
- Suspending group activities for the whole facility as opposed to just the quarantined neighborhoods.
- Limit visitors to the neighborhood as much as possible
 - Educate those that choose to visit
 - Promote strict adherence to infection control measures
- Resident needs still need to be met. Services and activities are brought to the neighborhood.
- ▶ Going back to "normal"



Environmental Services

- Communicate the importance of this department
- Make sure they are one of the first departments notified
- Cleaning the environment is everyone's responsibility, not just EVS staff
- ► Increase the frequency of cleaning and disinfecting of high touch surfaces and patient care areas using an EPA approved product for Healthcare.

Staff

- Remind staff to stay home when sick
- Get vaccinated
- Consistent staffing on the quarantined neighborhood
 - Try to keep staff that has already been exposed to the outbreak on those neighborhoods
 - Do not float to unaffected neighborhoods if possible
- No traveling through quarantined areas
- ▶ Exclude non-essential staff from affected area
